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## **Part A: Introduction**

## Overview

The International Classification of External Causes of Injury (ICECI) is a system of classifications to enable systematic description of how injuries occur. It is designed especially to assist injury prevention.

The ICECI was originally designed for use in settings in which information is recorded in a way that allows statistical reporting – for example, injury surveillance based on collection of information about cases attending a sample of hospital emergency departments. It has also been found useful for other purposes. For example, it has been used as a reference classification during revision of another classification, to record risk-factor exposure of children in a cohort study, as the basis for special-purpose classifications and in a growing number of other ways.<sup>1</sup>

The ICECI is a Related Classification in the World Health Organization Family of International Classifications (WHO-FIC). The ICECI is related to the External Causes chapter of the WHO International Classification of Diseases (ICD).<sup>2</sup> Both the ICECI and the External Causes chapter of the ICD provide ways to classify and code external causes of injuries. Different design criteria have resulted in considerable differences between the two systems, and comprehensive mapping at fine level is not possible.<sup>3</sup> However, the ICECI has been designed to map to a table of aggregated categories, to which data coded to the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> revisions of the ICD can also be mapped.<sup>4</sup> This coding bridge is described more fully later in this chapter.

The ICECI is multi-axial, modular and hierarchical.

The <u>multi-axial</u> structure of the ICECI enables numerous factors to be recorded independently of one another. Coding of, for example, objects or substances involved in the occurrence of an injury is possible irrespective of how, or whether, other items have been coded (intent, for example).

The ICECI can be used in its full form - that is, using all items in all modules, all at their most detailed coding level. Parts of the ICECI can also be used, when that is more convenient. The modular and hierarchical features of the ICECI facilitates this.

The <u>modular</u> structure of the ICECI groups together sets of items which are likely to be used together. For example, the **Core** module includes items that are generally useful for injury surveillance. The **Sports** module includes items that might be used when sports injury is a special focus of a data collection. A data collection with a more general purpose might omit the **Sports** module, opting to rely on the less detailed coverage of external causes of sports injury provided by the **Core** module.

The <u>hierarchical</u> structure of items in the ICECI allows users to choose from up to three levels of detail for data collection and reporting. The level used can differ between items and modules.

## Guide to this document

This document has four parts.

Part A is this introductory chapter. It provides information about the ICECI.

Part B contains the ICECI system organised into modules and items. It contains tables ordered according to ICECI code values. The entry for each item is structured in a standard way. It begins with a section providing information about the item (ie. meta-data), such as its name and definition, when it was last revised, and a guide for use. For most items, this is followed by a list of the codes and category labels in the item. This is termed the 'Overview of codes'. Finally, all items have a 'Full list of codes with inclusion and exclusion criteria'. This table contains the most detailed information about categories. For many categories, Inclusion and Exclusion terms are provided to help specify the intended scope. Additional information is provided in this table for some categories. The 'Full list' table for an item, read in conjunction with glossary definitions (Part C), information in the meta-information table for the item, and meta-information for the module in which it is located, is definitive.

<u>Part C</u> is a glossary of important terms used in the ICECI. When these words are used in the ICECI they are intended to have the meanings stated in the glossary. Versions of the ICECI provided as electronic documents include links from occurrences of these words in Part B to the glossary, to simplify the user's task of checking for meanings of the words in ICECI. (Where a glossary term appears repeatedly in a short passage, usually only one occurrence has been linked.)

<u>Part D</u> is an index to this version of the ICECI. The index is designed to assist users to find relevant categories in the tabular lists (Part B).

The index contains a set of entries, arranged alphabetically. Most index entries refer to a single category in one ICECI coding item. Some entries refer to a single category in each of several ICECI coding items. This occurs when similarly-named categories appear in different parts of the coding system. For example, a bicycle can be involved in several ways as an external cause of injury. This is represented in the excerpt from the index shown here:

#### Bicycle

- Object C.3.1.01.05
- Mode of Transport T.1.2
- Transport Counterpart T.3.2

This index entry shows that a bicycle can be the mode of transport of the injured person, the counterpart in a transport collision, or an object producing injury, whether or not in the context of transport (eg. a bicycle could produce injury by falling on a person, or while it is being repaired, or in other ways).

Every category in the tabular lists (Part B) is referred to by at least one index entry, normally worded in the same way as the corresponding category label in the tabular list.

Many categories in the tabular lists are also referred to by one or more additional index entries. These entries are designed to cater for variations, synonyms, subordinate concepts and alternative spellings

of the code label in the tabular list, and for inclusion terms specified in the tabular list. Examples are shown in <u>Table 1</u>.

Versions of the ICECI provided as electronic documents include a link from each index entry to the category in Part B to which it refers.

The index is a finding aid, to assist users to locate appropriate categories in the tabular lists in Part B. Some index entries, read in isolation from the additional information in the tabular lists, can be ambiguous. Reference should be made to the tabular lists to confirm the choice of a code, and the tabular list should be given primacy if uncertainty arises.

## Guide to using the ICECI

#### ICECI as a basis for injury surveillance systems

The ICECI is a set of classifications designed to be useful for injury surveillance. It provides one of the ingredients required for effective injury surveillance. It is beyond the scope of this document to provide guidance on the design, implementation and operation of injury surveillance systems. Readers seeking information on these matters are referred to

#### Selecting components of the ICECI

Depending on the objectives and setting of a data collection system, it will be necessary and feasible to collect all or some data elements from the ICECI. ICECI data items focus on external causes of injury. These will normally be supplemented by other items, typically including demographic items (eg. age, sex), dates and perhaps times (eg. of injury), the nature of injury sustained (Chapter XIX in ICD-10 may be suitable if fairly detailed information is required), and perhaps the outcome of injury. Other items may be required.

Inclusion of a description of the way an injury occurred, usually recorded as text in natural language, adds to the usefulness of injury surveillance systems. Detailed (and consequently lengthy) structured descriptions are particularly valuable. An example is the written findings provided by some officials, such as Coroners, who inquire into the circumstances of certain deaths.<sup>5</sup> However, even short descriptions, containing only a few words, can provide information which complements and enhances the value of coded data.<sup>6</sup>

Selection of ICECI components for inclusion as part of the data set for an information system should take account of the information required, and the resources available. In general, including more items adds to the burden of collection. If the burden of collection is heavy in relation to resources available for the purpose, then quality and sustainability of the system are likely to suffer. Effects on quality typically include reduced case ascertainment (ie. some cases are not collected), reduced record completeness (ie. some data items are not collected for some cases) and reduced reliability of data collected and of the codes selected.




Figure 1. Relationship between items in the Core Module and the Additional Modules

The modular and hierarchical structure of the ICECI is designed to allow users to select components to fit their needs, resources and capabilities. See Figure 1 and Table 2.

The **Core** module includes a set of items which were chosen to provide a good overview of the external causes of injury cases in general. <u>Mechanism</u> records HOW the injury came about, and <u>Objects/Substances</u> records WHAT types of things were involved in this process. <u>Place</u> gives insight into WHERE the injurious event occurred. The type of <u>Activity</u> of the person when injured can give insights that are useful for linking formal responsibilities (eg. of employers and others for occupational safety) to needs and opportunities for injury prevention. The role of human <u>Intent</u> in the occurrence of

injuries can sometimes be difficult to determine, but is important for developing strategies for intervention. Certain psycho-active substances are important risk factors for injury, and items are provided in the **Core** module for <u>Alcohol Use</u> and use of other <u>Drugs</u>.

ICECI items with extensive classifications have been designed to be useable at two or three levels of detail, both for data collection and for data reporting (<u>Table 2</u>).

Users of the ICECI are encouraged to consider using all of the items in the **Core** module, at least at Level 1, because this set of items has been designed to be used together to provide a good description of external causes. If the user wants to distinguish between the main types of injury events, the minimally required data set is: Intent, Place of Occurrence, Activity when injured, and Mechanism of Injury, each coded at the first level.

Capability to map to ICD external causes of injury via the coding bridge (described later in this chapter) requires <u>Mechanism</u> (Level 3), <u>Intent</u> (Level 2), <u>Place</u> (Level 1) and <u>Activity</u> (Level 2). Full mapping capability also requires the **Transport** module.

Additional modules have been provided to allow more detailed collection of external causes in areas known to be of wide interest. Figure 1 shows the relationship of the **Core** module and additional modules diagrammatically. The data items in each module are listed in <u>Table 2</u>.

The additional modules were designed to be used in conjunction with the **Core** module, each supplementing its coverage in a particular area.

The <u>Violence</u> module provides additional items relevant to study of violence directed towards others (ie. assault, homicide, etc) and self-directed violence (ie. self-harm, suicide, etc). This module is linked to the <u>Intent</u> item in the **Core** module. Items in the **Violence** module are designed to be used for cases coded to certain Intent categories. A table on the first page of the **Violence** module provides details.

The <u>Transport</u> module provides additional items particularly relevant to road injury. The items are closely related conceptually to the section of the ICD-10 External Causes chapter covering this topic. This module is linked to the <u>Mechanism</u> item in the **Core** module. It is designed to enable capture of more detailed information about cases coded to <u>Mechanism</u> = C2.1.1 Transport injury event. The **Transport** module is required if full capability is wanted to map to ICD external causes via the coding bridge (described later in this chapter).

The <u>Place</u> module contains items which originate from a recognition that there are numerous ways to categorise locations. The place item in the **Core** module follows the approach taken in the ICD, which can be seen as grouping types of place largely according to typical patterns of authority and responsibility concerning them. The **Place** module supplements this with other categorisations of places, such as parts of places (eg. types of room, such as bathrooms) and further detail (eg. types of home). This module is linked to the <u>Place</u> item in the **Core** module and items in the **Place** module are designed to elaborate cases given certain values in the **Core** module <u>Place</u> item. A table on the first page of the **Place** module specifies the relationship.

The <u>Sports</u> module provides a detailed classification of types of sport and related activities, and includes items on protective factors. This Module is linked to the <u>Activity</u> item in the **Core** module.

The <u>Occupational</u> module provides classifications of occupations and industries, derived from United Nations standard classifications on these subjects. Occupation and industry are typically regarded as being very important components of injury data collections for occupational safety, because they enable data to be reported in ways relevant to economic sectors which have responsibility for prevention, and for other reasons. This Module is linked to the <u>Activity</u> item in the **Core** module.

## Governance of the ICECI

## **Technical issues**

#### Version status

Information about the status of each ICECI data item is included in the background and guidelines at the start of its entry in Part B.

The following checks and changes were made during preparation of version 1.2 (late 2003 and early 2004):

Part A: Largely rewritten.

<u>Part B</u>: Consistency of formats, styles and layout was improved. Use of styles was revised extensively and enhanced, in preparation for conversion of the tabular lists to a data base. Hyperlinks were added to cross-reference categories mentioned in exclusion terms and glossary terms. Background information and guidelines were updated. General checks were made for errors and inconsistencies (eg. duplicate code values, inconsistency in codes or labels), and those found were corrected. <u>Part C:</u> Wording was reviewed and revised.

<u>Part D</u>: Entirely new, though based on the preliminary version presented at the WHO-FIC meeting at Cologne in October 2003.

Refer to the introductory chapter of ICECI version 1.1a for an overview of earlier developments.

#### Updates and revision

The ICECI will undergo development as experience and assessment leads to recommendations for additions and changes. Refer to <u>www.iceci.org</u> for current information.

Minor and Major revisions of the ICECI will be made.

<u>Minor</u> revisions (eg. 1.1 to 1.2): Minor revisions are intended to allow improvements to the ICECI of types that will not require substantial revision of systems based on the ICECI. Minor revisions

may include correction of errors, omissions, ambiguities, etc with minimal change to categories and codes. The meaning of existing ICECI codes will not be changed. Items and modules may be added, but not removed or altered (except to correct errors, etc). Minor revisions will be designed to be backwardly compatible with previous versions, within a major version, at a fine level of granularity. Likely frequency: every one or two years.

<u>Major</u> revisions (eg. 1.2 to 2.0): As for minor, but could also include changes which affect the structure, scope, or definition of items, change the meaning of codes, or involve the removal of items, or modules of items. Likely frequency: once or twice per decade.

Input to revisions will be sought through routine and special means:

<u>Routine</u>: User queries, comments and advice are invited at any time via the ICECI web site. They can also be addressed to members of the ICECI Coordination and Maintenance Group. <u>Special</u>: Input will be sought actively as part of the process for major reviews. This will include consultation with, and via, WHO-FIC Centre Heads and the WHO office, and notification of groups and individuals likely to have an interest.

## How to report errors and omissions

Error reports can be submitted at any time via <u>www.iceci.org</u>, or directly to a member of the ICECI-CMG. Significant errors will be notified via the ICECI website, pending release of a corrected version.


## Relationship between ICECI and ICD

The ICECI is designed to have a role complementary to the ICD-10 external causes classification.<sup>2</sup> The ICD, including its external causes classification, is the reference classification for international reporting of mortality. The ICD – often in a clinical modification – is widely used to classify hospital inpatient cases. As a specialised system focusing on external causes of injury, the ICECI enables more detailed and flexible classification in its subject area. The ICECI can be used in many settings, including emergency departments, clinics, in-patient hospital settings; in ad hoc studies and surveys; and specialised mortality registration systems.

The relationship between the ICECI and the ICD is shown schematically in <u>Figure 2</u>. Most parts of the ICD (ie. Chapters I to XIX and Chapter XXI) do not deal with external causes of injury and poisoning. Hence, most of the ICD is beyond the scope of the ICECI, and issues of comparability do not arise.

Some parts of the ICECI fall beyond the scope of the ICD-10 External Causes chapter. This applies, for example, to items in some of the ICECI special modules (eg. <u>Proximal risk factors for intentional self-harm; previous suicide attempt; sex of perpetrator; context of assault; phase of [sports] activity</u>). Issues of comparability do not normally arise for these.

However, the conceptual scope of several items in the **Core** module of the ICECI overlaps with the scope of ICD-10 Chapter XX. The ICECI items for which this is most clearly so are: <u>Intent</u>, <u>Mechanism</u>, <u>Place</u>, <u>Activity</u> and the <u>Transport module</u>. Issues of comparability arise for these parts of the ICECI.

The <u>Place</u> and <u>Activity</u> items in the ICECI were designed to be comparable to categories in the ICD-10 Place and Activity classifications. The relationship is shown in Tables <u>3</u> and <u>4</u>. ICECI Level 1 Place and Activity categories map directly to ICD Place and Activity categories, apart from minor differences in scope for two Place categories.

The Intent, Mechanism and Transport module items in the ICECI have a more complex relationship with ICD-10 Chapter XX (Table 5). A major factor underlying the development of the ICECI has been dissatisfaction with some aspects of the ICD External Causes chapter for certain purposes related to injury prevention. It was not possible to develop a version of ICECI which mapped directly to categories in the External Causes chapter at fine level without forcing the ICECI to take on characteristics of the External Causes chapter which had prompted development of the new approach. However, it was recognised by the ICECI development group that maximal comparability with ICD was a necessary design criterion.

The solution arrived at was to specify mapping between ICECI and ICD at the level of a previously published reporting standard for injury data.<sup>4</sup> This is shown in <u>Figure 2</u> as the 'bridge' between ICECI and ICD.

The MMWR reference cited above specified the 'Intent' and 'Mechanism/Cause' categories of the Framework in terms of ICD-9 External Cause codes. Subsequent work has adapted the Framework for use with ICD-10 [www.cdc.gov/nchs/about/otheract/ice/matrix10.htm]. The Framework has also been specified in terms of ICECI.<sup>3</sup> ICECI version 1.2 and ICD-10 External Causes are both mapped onto the Framework in Table 5.

ICD-10 values are shown within cells of the matrix. ICECI-coded cases corresponding to a cell in the Framework are those having the Intent (C1) code value below the cell (in the last row of the table) <u>and</u>

the Mechanism (C2), and sometimes Transport (T) module, code values to the right of the cell (in the last column of the table).

## Background and acknowledgments

During the second half of the twentieth century, statistical information about factors contributing to the occurrence of injury cases was often recorded using the external causes classification of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD).<sup>2, 7</sup> Since at least the early 1980s, injury research and prevention experts have argued that the ICD classification lacked the scope, specificity and flexibility needed to inform many injury prevention and control activities adequately.<sup>8, 9</sup>

Beginning in the early 1990s, international meetings on injury surveillance methods were held under the auspices of the World Health Organization. Participants began by comparing responses to the problem of inadequate classifications.<sup>10</sup> It was soon recognised that systems to classify external causes of injury, which had been developed in several parts of the world, had strong similarities. By the mid 1990s this led to the conclusion that it was feasible and desirable to develop an internationally harmonised classification of external causes of injury. Work towards this aim commenced soon afterwards, and ultimately resulted in the ICECI.

The ICECI was designed to help researchers and prevention practitioners to:

- define more precisely the domain of injuries they are studying;
- answer questions on the circumstances in which the injuries occurred; and
- provide more detailed information about specific type of cases (eg. those related to transport, sport or violence).

The design and contents of the ICECI are intended to reflect contemporary best practice for injury surveillance and an international consensus about how external causes may be described. These foundations of the ICECI are likely to change in time. An effort has been made to allow for this by designing the ICECI in a way that will facilitate change.

A draft version of the ICECI was released in 1998 for comment and testing.<sup>11</sup> Testing in this phase of development included review (by 60 respondents from 30 organisations in 14 countries), case scenario validation, and field tests.<sup>12-15</sup> Feedback resulting from the testing activities was incorporated into version 1.0 of the ICECI, released in 2001.<sup>16</sup>

A taxonomic review and refinement of the Core and Transport modules was undertaken for the ICECI Development Group during mid-2002. Further minor alterations, largely made in response to comments from CAS-WHO, resulted in version 1.1a of the ICECI tabular lists, which was endorsed by the ICECI-CMG in April 2003. The first version of an ICECI index, prepared in mid-2003, was paired with version 1.1a of the tabular lists for submission to the WHO-FIC meeting at Cologne in October 2003, at which the ICECI was admitted to the WHO-FIC as a Related Classification.

Version 1.2 is the product of a minor revision of the version admitted to the WHO-FIC. No items or modules were added or removed and categories were only altered where necessary to correct errors. The main features of this revision were improvement of the index (many terms were added), revision and expansion of the introductory chapter (to reflect the current status of the ICECI), and addition of features to improve useability (eg. integration of the index and provision of hyperlinked cross-references). A less visible change is revision and improvement of consistency of styles and formats in source documents.

#### Acknowledgments

The ICECI is the outcome of the work of many people, over a long period.

While development of the ICECI was prompted partly by limitations of the ICD external cause codes, it also builds upon that classification. Particularly noteworthy in this regard are Jacques Bertillon and the others whose work led to the International Classification of Diseases, and the committee for the sixth revision of the ICD, whose willingness to "attack boldly" the previously troublesome section on Accidents, Poisonings, and Violence did more than any other to improve the ICD's treatment of injury and external causes, by introducing separate axes of classification for several concepts of statistical interest.<sup>17</sup> In doing this they adopted an approach that been proposed by William Farr nearly a century earlier.<sup>18</sup>

The structure and design of the ICECI are based more directly on innovative injury classification and surveillance systems developed during the latter part of the twentieth century. The most important of these antecedents are the CPSC National Electronic Injury Surveillance System in the USA<sup>19</sup>, the Nordic Classification of External Causes of Injury (largely due to Henning Bay-Nielsen, Denmark)<sup>20</sup> and the National Injury Surveillance and Prevention Project (largely due to Jerry Moller and Graham Vimpani, Australia)<sup>21</sup> and the Dutch Injury Surveillance System (LIS)<sup>22</sup>.

Development of the ICECI, under this name, dates from about 1997. The individuals listed below made specific contributions to its development, at various times from 1997 to early 2004.

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Many other people around the world tested draft versions of ICECI, and provided comments and advice. Their valuable input resulted in important improvements to the ICECI.

Carole Craft (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention), Joke Broekhuizen (Consumer Safety Institute) and Stacey Avefua (AIHW National Injury Surveillance Unit) made important secretarial and editorial contributions. Rachel Newson (AIHW National Injury Surveillance Unit) did much of the development of index terms, and made other contributions. ## **C - CORE MODULE**

#### Introduction:

The Core Module includes a set of items which provide a good overview of the external causes of injury cases. It has seven data elements: Intent, Mechanism of injury (full and short version), Object/substance producing injury, Place of occurrence, Activity when injured, Alcohol use and Psychoactive drug or other substance use.

#### Context:

Mechanism records HOW the injurious interaction took place, and Objects/Substances records WHAT types of things were involved in this process. Place gives insight into WHERE the injurious event occurred. The type of Activity of the person when injured can give insights that are useful for linking formal responsibilities (eg. of employers and others for occupational safety) to needs and opportunities for injury prevention. The role of human Intent in the occurrence of injuries has deep and sometimes complex relationships with the causes and prevention of injury. Certain psycho-active substances are important risk factors for injury, and items are provided in the Core module for Alcohol Use and use of other Drugs.

#### Guide for use:

Full (C2) and short (M1) versions of the Mechanism of injury item are provided.

## **Definition:**

The role of human purpose in the injury event.

## Context:

<u>Intent</u> data provide information about the role of human *intent* in the occurrence of an <u>injury</u>. This information can affect patient care and guide efforts to prevent *injury* recurrence. For example, the clinical and preventive approach to a person presenting with an *injury* is likely to differ according to whether the *injury* is thought to be intentional or unintentional, and whether it is self-inflicted or inflicted by another.

Personal, social, and legal sensitivities often apply to intentional conceptual reasons, determination of the *intent* of *injury* cases is often difficult.

## Guide for use:

In general, *intent* is primarily determined by the incident and not by the resulting *injury*.

To code Intent:

- Select the code that best describes the intent of the injury event.
- Code injuries sustained by a bystander to a violent incident, or by a non-combatant in a conflict, as <u>assault</u>.
- Code injuries resulting from animal attacks as unintentional, unless the animal was used as a weapon by a person *intent* on inflicting *injury*.
- Consider *injuries* to children under age five years who harm themselves to be unintentional, except in the case of an individual who bangs his or her head in anger or frustration.

#### Notes:

The *Intent* data element includes the category complications of medical or surgical care to maintain correspondence with *ICD*-10 External cause (Chapter XX).

Some codes under *Intent* indicate relevant data elements in the <u>Violence</u> Module. When noted, refer to that module and code all appropriate elements.

## **Definition:**

The way in which the injury was sustained (ie., how the person was hurt).

## Context:

Physical *injury* results when human tissue is acutely exposed to some form of energy and sustains some form of damage. An *injury* may also result from an insufficiency of any of the vital elements (eg., in <u>drowning/near drowning</u>, strangulation, or freezing). The process by which *injury* occurs may be described as the "<u>mechanism of injury</u>."

## Guide for use:

Injuries are often the result of a sequence of events. Different types of mechanisms are usually involved in the *injury* 

- <u>Underlying mechanisms</u>—those involved at the start of the injury event
- <u>Direct mechanisms</u>—those producing the actual physical harm
- Intermediate mechanisms—others mechanisms involved in the injury event.

The direct and *underlying mechanism*s may be the same. For example, if a person cuts his or her finger with a knife while preparing food, the cutting of the finger is both the direct and *underlying mechanism*. Coding *mechanism of injury* in these situations is straightforward. Other situations are more complex. For example, if a woman trips over an appliance cord and hits her head on a counter, the tripping over the cord is the *underlying mechanism* (the action that starts the *injury event*), and the contact with the counter is the direct mechanism (the action that causes the actual physical harm).

Because *injury event*s often involve more than one mechanism, and because the sequence of events leading to an *injury* is not always clear, identifying the *underlying mechanism of injury* may be difficult. Moreover, information available in case notes does not always allow for distinguishing between types of mechanisms.

Mechanism of Injury has three levels of codes, with the third level being the most detailed.

To code Mechanism of Injury—Full Version:

- Code up to **two** mechanisms of *injury* using the most detailed level of coding possible. If it is possible to distinguish between types of mechanisms, code the *underlying mechanism* first, followed by the *direct mechanism*.
- If more than one *underlying mechanism* is involved, select the underlying and *direct mechanism*s that resulted in the more severe *injury*.
- If the injuries are equally severe, select the underlying and *direct mechanisms* of the *injury* that appears first in the case information.
- If it is not possible to distinguish between types of mechanisms, code up to two mechanisms in the sequence they appear in the case information.

Some codes in Mechanism of *Injury* note relevant data elements in the Transport Module. This module, composed of four data elements, allows for coding additional details about transportation-related *injury* incidents. When noted in Mechanism of *Injury*, please refer to the relevant data element in the Transport Module and select the appropriate codes.

#### Notes:

All three coding levels were based on the experience of the technical group members and on a variety of existing coding structures, including <u>ICD-10</u>. We also drew on comments put forward by participants in the ICECI testing project conducted in 1999. We realise that the coding hierarchy will not be equally intuitive for all users, in all settings, and for all cases. This is a consequence of the diversity of mechanisms and of the ways they are involved in *injury event*s. On balance, however, the structure given to the list of categories by the hierarchical arrangement has been found to simplify its use. More flexible organisation will be possible in computer-based applications of the categories.

Gaps exist in the sequence of codes. These gaps allow for the addition of codes between major version changes.

A short version of *Mechanism of Injury* is also available. <u>See Mechanism of Injury – Short</u> <u>Version</u>.

# **Definition:**

The way in which the injury was sustained (ie., how the person was hurt).

# Context:

Physical *injury* results when human tissue is acutely exposed to some form of energy and sustains some form of damage. An *injury* may also result from an insufficiency of any of the vital elements (eg., in <u>drowning</u> /<u>near drowning</u>, strangulation, or freezing). The process by which *injury* occurs may be described as the "<u>mechanism of injury</u>."

# Guide for use:

Injuries are often the result of a sequence of events. Different types of mechanisms are usually involved in the *injury*:

- <u>Underlying mechanisms</u>—those involved at the start of the <u>injury event</u>
- <u>Direct mechanisms</u>—those producing the actual physical harm
- Intermediate mechanisms—others mechanisms involved in the injury event

The direct and *underlying mechanisms* may be the same. For example, if a person cuts his or her finger with a knife while preparing food, the cutting of the finger is both the direct and *underlying mechanism*. Coding *mechanism of injury* in these situations is straightforward. Other situations are more complex. For example, if a woman trips over an appliance cord and hits her head on a counter, the tripping over the cord is the *underlying mechanism* (the action that starts the *injury event*), and the contact with the counter is the *direct mechanism* (the action that causes the actual physical harm).

Some situations are further complicated by an *underlying mechanism* that leads to more than one *injury*. For example, a *car* crash—one *underlying mechanism*—may result in several *direct mechanism*s of *injury*, such as contact with the steering wheel, being cut by broken glass, and having one's foot caught in the *car*'s crushed frame. Each of these mechanisms may cause different injuries.

Because *injury event*s often involve more than one mechanism, and because the sequence of events leading to an *injury* is not always clear, identifying the *underlying mechanism of injury* may be difficult. Moreover, information available in case notes does not always allow for distinguishing between types of mechanisms.

To code Mechanism of Injury-Short Version:

- Code only **one** *mechanism of injury*. If it is possible to distinguish between types of mechanisms, code the *underlying mechanism*.
- If more than one *underlying mechanism* is involved, select the *underlying mechanism* that resulted in the more severe *injury*.
- If the injuries are equally severe, select the *underlying mechanism* of the *injury* that appears first on the code list.

If it is not possible to distinguish between types of mechanisms, code the mechanism that appears first in the case information.

Gaps exist in the sequence of codes. These gaps allow for the addition of codes between major version changes.

# **Definition:**

Matter, material or thing being involved in the injury event.

# Context:

An **object** (eg., a <u>car</u>, heater, knife) or **substance** (eg., hot water, flames) conveys the mechanism of an *injury*. The aim of this data element is to provide specific categories for objects/substances commonly involved in producing <u>injury</u>, and broader categories for almost all objects/substances.

# Guide for use:

Injuries are often the result of a sequence of events. Three types of objects/substances may be involved in the *injury event*.

- <u>Underlying object/substance</u>—the object/substance involved at the start of the *injury event*
- <u>Direct object/substance</u>—the object/substance producing the actual physical harm
- Intermediate objects/substances—other objects/substances involved in the injury event

The direct and underlying objects/substances may be the same. For example, if a person cuts his or her finger with a knife while preparing food, the knife is involved at the start of the *injury event*, and it is the object that produces the actual physical harm. Coding object/substance data in these situations is straightforward. Other situations are more complex. For example, if a woman trips over an appliance cord and hits her head on a counter, the appliance cord is the underlying object, and the counter is the *Direct object*.

Some situations are further complicated by several objects producing injuries. In the case of a *car* crash, there may be an underlying object—for example, the tree the *car* hit—and several *Direct object*s, such as the steering wheel, the dashboard, and the windshield. Each of the *Direct object*s may cause different injuries.

*Injury event*s are not always a clear sequence of events involving objects/substances in clear succession. Moreover, information available in case notes often does not allow for distinguishing between the types of objects or substances. Object/Substance Producing *Injury* has three levels of codes, the third level being the most detailed.

To code Object/Substance Producing Injury:

- Select up to **three** objects/substances. If it is possible to distinguish between the different types of objects/substances, code the *underlying object/substance* first, followed by the *Direct object*/substance. Last, code any intermediate objects/substances mentioned or thought relevant.
- If more than one underlying object is involved, select the underlying and *Direct objects* that resulted in the more severe *injury*.
- If the injuries are equally severe, select the underlying and *Direct objects* of the *injury* mentioned first in the case information.
- If it is not possible to distinguish between the different types of objects/substances, code up to three objects/substances in the sequence they appear in the case information.

# Notes:

All three levels of coding categories were based on the experience of the technical group members and a variety of existing coding structures, including *ICD*-10. We also drew on comments put forward by participants in the ICECI testing project conducted in 1999, as well as on input by recognised experts from various fields. We realise that the coding hierarchy will not be equally intuitive for all users, in all settings and for all cases. This is a consequence of the diversity of objects/substances and of the ways they are involved in *injury events*. On balance, however, the structure given to the list of categories by the hierarchical arrangement has been found to simplify its use. More flexible organisation will be possible in computer-based applications of the categories.

Gaps exist in the sequence of codes, primarily in the third level codes. These gaps allow for the addition of codes between major version changes.



#### **Definition:**

Where the injured person was when the injury event started.

#### Context:

<u>Place of Occurrence</u> data help group injuries by areas of responsibility and may help <u>injury</u> <u>prevention</u> practitioners better target interventions and use resources more effectively. This information can also provide insight into <u>injury aetiology</u>. To most accurately identify the sector of responsibility for injury prevention, combine Place of Occurrence data with <u>Activity when</u> <u>injured</u> data.

#### Guide for use:

Place of Occurrence has two coding levels, the second level being more detailed. Not all places, however, have a second coding level. NOTE: The codes represent where the injured person was when the *injury event* **began**, not when the *injury event* ended.

To code Place of Occurrence:

- Select the place where things started to go wrong. Choose a category referring to the whole entity (ie., a structure or space owned or operated as a whole) within which an *injury* occurred, rather than a category referring to only a part of such an entity. For example, if an *injury* occurs while being in a swimming pool in a holiday park; code Place of Occurrence as Holiday park (10.5), rather than Swimming pool (5.3).
- If more than one injury is involved, select the place associated with the more severe *injury*. If the injuries are equally severe, select the place that appears first in the code list.

In general, places include attached grounds, outbuildings, etc. For example, <u>Home (1)</u> includes the dwelling and any associated garden, garage, shed, etc. Likewise, Factory/plant (<u>8.3</u>) includes buildings and premises like <u>roadways</u>, <u>parking areas</u>, and industrial yards. Any exceptions to this rule are specified by inclusions and exclusions for given codes.

#### Notes:

Some categories note relevant data elements in the <u>Place Module</u>. This module, composed of seven data elements, allows for coding additional details about where the <u>injury event</u> occurred. Please refer to the Place Module and select the appropriate code(s).

#### **Definition:**

The type of activity the injured person was engaged in when the injury occurred.

#### Context:

Activity when injured data allow injury cases to be grouped into categories that correspond to areas of responsibility for injury prevention. Being able to identify, for example, injuries that occur while a person is working or injuries that occur while playing a sport may help guide development of more effective prevention strategies. Activity data are especially useful when combined with Place of occurrence data. Together, these data allow practitioners to identify the responsible sector for *injury prevention* and control. The major areas of responsibility are not mutually exclusive. For example, a bus driver's colliding with a tree while driving his *bus* on public road could be considered both a traffic injury event and an occupational injury event. The issue of overlap arises especially with *Activity when injured*.

#### Guide for use:

When selecting the code for *Activity when injured*, determine the area of responsibility and the main purpose of the activity. If there is more than one area of responsibility, use the inclusion and exclusion criteria to help determine the most appropriate code. These criteria, typically listed under the more detailed level of codes, serve to clarify overlap between such areas as occupational and *sports injury events*; *education*al and *sports injury events*; occupational and *traffic injury events*; and *sports and exercise* during *leisure* time and *leisure* and *play* activities.

#### To code Activity when injured:

- Select the category that best describes the activity the injured person was engaged in when the *injury* occurred.
- If two or more activity codes are judged to be equally appropriate, select the one that comes first in the code list.

Some codes note relevant data elements in the Occupational Module or *Sports* Module. These modules, composed of two and four data elements, respectively, offer additional details about the activity engaged in when *injury* occurred. When noted, please refer to the indicated module and select the appropriate code.

Alcohol use is a known risk factor for injuries. Therefore, it is important to collect information about the involvement of *alcohol use* in *injury events*. In some cases, biological quantitative information about *alcohol use* (eg., blood or breath alcohol level) is available. In other cases, one may merely suspect *alcohol use* (eg., if the patient smells of alcohol). This data element indicates whether there is either suspicion or evidence of *alcohol use*. No distinction is made between suspicion and evidence because criteria for each category are too difficult to define.

#### Guide for use:

Code this item for each <u>injury</u> case, regardless of the severity of *injury*, age of the injured person, or *intent* of the *injury event*.

If more information is available (eg., type of suspicion or evidence, characterisation of others involved in the *injury event*), please add this detail to the narrative.

Use of psychoactive drugs or other substances is a known risk factor for injuries. Therefore, it is important to collect information about the involvement of drug use and other substance use in *injury events*. In some cases, biological quantitative information about drug or substance use (eg., blood/urine drug level) is available. In other cases, one may merely suspect drug or substance use (eg., if the patient has injection marks). This data element indicates whether there is either suspicion or evidence of <u>alcohol use</u>. No distinction is made between suspicion and evidence because criteria for each category are too difficult to define.

#### Guide for use:

Code this item for each *injury* case, regardless of the severity of *injury*, age of the injured person, or *intent* of the *injury* event.

If more information is available (eg., type of suspicion or evidence, characterisation of others involved in the *injury event*), please add this detail to the narrative.

#### **V - VIOLENCE MODULE**

#### Introduction:

The <u>Violence</u> Module provides additional information about intentional injuries, whether selfinflicted or directed at others. The module consists of seven data elements. These elements are listed in the table below, along with the <u>Intent</u> codes to which they relate.

#### Context:

The <u>Violence</u> Module provides data collectors with uniform code sets to better describe the problem of fatal and nonfatal <u>injuries</u> related to *violence*. The data from this module can help practitioners identify circumstances that put individuals at risk for *violence*-related *injury* and guide development of prevention strategies.

#### Guide for use:

For each relevant data element noted in Intent, select the appropriate code.

#### Notes:

Certain data elements are to be included as a minimum for *violence*-related *injury*, while others are optional (Ref. WHO Guidelines for *Injury* Surveillance in Less-Resourced Environments ). The former include <u>Perpetrator/victim relationship</u> and precipitating factors (<u>Context of assault</u>, <u>Proximal risk factors for intentional self-harm</u>). It is also strongly recommended that the object be coded.

The *classification* of data elements for *violence*-related injuries is compatible with *ICD*-10 External Causes (Chapter XX).

No single ideal data source exists that will provide quality information about *violence*-related injuries. An acute care setting such as an emergency department will probably be the most commonly used source of data on all types of injuries, including those related to *violence*. However, when gathering data about violent injuries, two major issues must be considered.

Firstly, certain types of <u>intentional injury events</u> tend to be missed. For example, abuse of partners, children, and elders may masquerade as *unintentional injury event*. While the emergency room is probably the best single source of data, one must recognise that information about injuries and events leading up to them will most likely be elicited from the victim, with attendant personal biases. To enhance the quantity and quality of data about *violence*-related injuries, data collectors must link to other sources such as law enforcement agencies, victims' crisis centres, and shelters.

Secondly, extreme care, sensitivity, and confidentiality must be *exercised* in extracting information from patients who have already undergone trauma from a violent event. Therefore, persons who gather and document *injury* information must be highly sensitised and well-trained. Moreover, services should be made available to the victim to immediately alleviate some of the trauma—both mental and physical—of the *injury event*.

# V1 - PROXIMAL RISK FACTORS FOR INTENTIONAL SELF-HARM

#### Status:

Tested 1999

#### Version:

#### **Required field length:**

n.n

#### **Definition:**

The most recent crises that led to the self-harm incident.

#### Context:

In many countries, <u>intentional self-harm</u> contributes to a large number of injuries. To better understand injuries related to this type of <u>violence</u>, it is important to collect information about factors that may be associated with such events. This information will help guide development of effective prevention strategies.

#### Guide for use:

Code this data element for all injuries related to intentional self-harm.

Select up to three factors, most recent to the <u>injury event</u>, that describe the reasons for the selfharm attempt.

If there is provision for only one factor, select the most recent factor.

#### Note:

This <u>classification</u> is among the most "exploratory" classifications in the ICECI. Little is known about the relationship between suicide events and some of the factors listed in the codes. Note that for this surveillance, the use of the words "victim" and "perpetrator" imply no judgement, legal or otherwise.

The victim will typically be a suspect or bystander. If an officer is the victim, consider the <u>injury</u> <u>event</u> an <u>assault</u>, not related to legal intervention. The only exception is if the officer is injured by another officer in the line of duty.

# **T - TRANSPORT MODULE**

#### Introduction:

The Transport Module provides basic information about transport-related injuries. It has four data elements: <u>Mode of transport</u>, <u>Role of the injured person</u>, <u>Counterpart</u>, and <u>Type of transport injury event</u>.

#### Context:

<u>Transport injury events</u> are among the leading causes of injuries that result in death and hospitalisation. This module is designed to collect data about the circumstances in which these injuries occur. Such information can help guide prevention strategies.

Neither the basic ICECI nor this module is designed to code detailed information about *transport injury events*, such as <u>road</u> conditions, speeding, or the use of occupant restraints. However, this information, when it is available, may be recorded in a text description of how the *injury* occurred. It may also be possible to use codes from <u>Object/substance producing injury</u> to identify some objects involved in collisions (eg., a tree, 13.01.35).

#### Guide for use:

Code the Transport Module for all injuries that involve a device designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, conveying persons or goods from one place to another. Always code all four data elements for this module.

#### Transport devices include:

- <u>land transport vehicles</u>, including on- and <u>off-road vehicles</u>, which may or may not be motor driven
- <u>watercraft</u>
- <u>aircraft</u>

Code an *injury* to a person <u>travelling</u> on foot or using a <u>pedestrian conveyance</u> only when a *transport device* is involved.

#### Notes about inclusions:

A transport device must be involved in the injury event.

The injured person may be:

- a <u>pedestrian</u>, including user of a *pedestrian conveyance* (eg., baby carriage or stroller, in-line skates, wheelchair)
- a user of a transport device

The injured person does not have to be a user of a *transport device* or a *pedestrian*. All of the following would be included:

- a person at a sidewalk café who was hit by a car that went out of control
- a swimmer who was hit by a boat
- a person on the ground who was injured when a plane crashed
- *Transport injury events* include falls in or from the following *transport devices* when they were not involved in a derailment, collision, or crash

T0 - Transport module

railway trains or <u>rail vehicles</u> and <u>streetcars</u> watercraft Aircraft (including injuries to parachutists)

Transport injury events also include:

- poisoning from exhaust gas generated by a vehicle in motion
- injury from being thrown against some part of, or object in, a vehicle in motion
- *injury* from a moving part of a vehicle in motion (eg., catching one's hand or neck in a moving <u>car</u> window)

#### Notes about exclusions:

The following types of events are not considered *transport injury events*:

- Events in which *pedestrian*s, or persons using *pedestrian conveyances*, are injured but there is no involvement of a *transport device*. None of the following would be included:
  - a pedestrian who fell on a sidewalk
  - an in-line skater who collided with a utility pole
  - a person in a wheelchair who collided with a pedestrian
- Events due to cataclysm (earthquake, volcanic eruption, avalanche, landslide or other earth movement, cataclysmic storm, flood). Neither of the following would be included:

injury due to a vehicle being caught in an avalanche or landslide

- injury to a motorcyclist swept off the road by a sudden flood
- Events unrelated to the movement or operation of a *transport device*. Neither of the following events would be included:

a child putting a bean in her ear while riding in a car

- being stung by a bee while riding in a *car* (as long as it did not result in loss of control and a collision or crash)
- Events involving land *transport devices* not in use for transport at the time (eg., *injury* due to a vehicle under repair in a garage or driveway *falling* on the person repairing it)

#### **Definition:**

The means by which the injured person was travelling from one place to another.

#### Context:

The way in which the injured person was *travelling* (eg., on foot, in an on- or <u>off-road vehicle</u>, in <u>watercraft</u>) is the most important factor to identify for use in preventing transport injuries. This information is classified using the Mode of Transport data element, which is based on the information for categories V01 to V99 in Chapter XX of *ICD*-10.

#### Guide for use:

Code Mode of Transport whenever the Transport Module is used.

- Select the code that best characterises how the injured person was *travelling* or, if not *travelling*, what he or she was doing at the time of <u>injury</u> in the context of a transport event. Therefore, the 'activity' (or what the injured person was doing at the time of the *injury*) is to be interpreted in the context of the specific codes listed in the transport module. For instance, if a child was riding a bicycle for <u>leisure</u> around his <u>home</u>, fell off, and got injured, then the <u>mode of transport</u> would be <u>pedal cycle</u> (2).
- If the injured person is described as crushed, dragged, hit, injured, killed, knocked down, or run over by any vehicle, and the transport event description does not specify the injured person as being a <u>vehicle occupant</u>, code the injured person as a <u>pedestrian</u> (<u>1</u>).
- If the injured person's *mode of transport* is not identified but it is known that the event was a collision, crash, wreck, or other *injury event* involving a *car*, bicycle, or other specified vehicle, code the injured person as a user of the vehicle mentioned.
- If the injured person's *mode of transport* is not identified and more than one vehicle is mentioned, do not assume which vehicle the victim occupied unless the vehicles are the same (eg., all cars). Instead, code Unspecified *mode of transport* (<u>99</u>).

Note that a person boarding or alighting from a vehicle is considered a user of the vehicle.

# **Definition:**

How the injured person was involved with the specified <u>mode of transport</u> at the time of the <u>injury event</u>.

#### Context:

A person injured in a *transport injury event* was fulfilling one of a variety of roles at the time of *injury*. Examples of common roles are <u>driver</u> (or rider) of a vehicle (or animal) and <u>passenger</u> in a vehicle. This information is classified using the Role of the Injured Person data element, which is based on the fourth character codes for categories V01 to V79 in Chapter XX of *ICD*-10.

#### Guide for use:

Code Role of the Injured Person for all transport injury events.

- Select the code that best characterises the *role of the injured person*, with respect to the *Mode of transport* already coded.
- If the transport event description does not indicate the injured person's role (eg., all that is known is that the event was a *car* or bicycle collision, crash, wreck, or other *injury event*), classify the role of the injured person as unspecified (9).

### **Definition:**

The other vehicle, object, person, or animal (if any) with which the injured person, or the vehicle in which the injured person was <u>travelling</u>, collided.

#### Context:

Many <u>transport injury events</u> involve collision of the injured person, or the vehicle in which the injured person was *travelling*, with one or more other people, animals, vehicles, or objects. These are referred to as <u>counterparts</u>. In some events (eg., if a *car* rolls in a ditch, without a prior collision), there is no *counterpart*. This information is classified using the *Counterpart* data element, which is based on the information for categories V01 to V80 in Chapter XX of *ICD*-10.

#### Guide for use:

Code Counterpart whenever the transport module is used.

Select the code that best characterises the *counterpart* of the injured person or of the vehicle in or on which the injured person was *travelling*.

Note that parked vehicles are classified as fixed or stationary objects (13.1).

Code No counterpart (15) only if there is no collision.

Record the counterpart even if a collision occurred after, and perhaps because of, another

event such as loss of control due to:

a burst tyre

 $\underline{\text{driver}} \text{ inattention}$ 

excessive speed

a vehicle being hit by an object thrown at it or dropped onto it

If the *injury event* was caused by something being thrown at, dropping on, or *falling* on a vehicle, code as follows:

If loss of control of the vehicle resulted in a subsequent collision, code the *counterpart* as the item with which the vehicle subsequently collided.

#### **Definition:**

The general nature of the <u>transport injury event</u> and, for a land transport event, where it occurred.

#### Context:

*Transport injury event*s may involve vehicles that operate on land, on water, or in the air, and the vehicles may be involved in the occurrence of injuries in several ways. Identification of these factors is important for <u>injury prevention</u>. Land vehicles may be involved in <u>traffic injury</u> <u>events</u>, which take place on <u>public highways</u>, <u>streets</u> or <u>roads</u>, or in <u>non-traffic injury event</u> while engaged in off-*road* transport. In addition, a vehicle may be the site of an *injury event* that is not related to a collision or crash. Basic information about the nature of the *transport injury event* is classified using Type of Transport Injury Event, which is based on the information for categories V01 to V99 in Chapter XX of *ICD*-10. The traffic/non-traffic distinction is necessary for mapping to V01 to V89.

#### Guide for use:

Code Type of Transport *Injury* Event for all *transport injury event*s. Select the code that best characterises where or how the *injury event* occurred. Classify *injury event*s involving more than one kind of transport as follows:

<u>aircraft</u> and land transport—Air or space transport crash or collision ( $\underline{6}$ ) aircraft and <u>watercraft</u>—Air or space transport crash or collision ( $\underline{6}$ ) watercraft and land transport—Water transport crash or collision ( $\underline{5}$ )

- Descriptions of land *transport injury events* do not always use the word traffic to describe an event that took place on a *public highway*, *street* or *road*, and they seldom use the term non-traffic to describe an event that occurred off the *road*. Therefore, be alert to any information that can help in classifying an event; consult the glossary for definitions of traffic and *non-traffic injury events*.
- If no information exists about where a land *transport injury event* occurred, code Land *transport injury event* unspecified whether traffic or non-traffic (<u>3</u>).
- If the injured person was a *passenger* in a railway train, *rail vehicle*, or *streetcar* that was not operating on a *public highway*, *street* or *road*, and the vehicle was involved in a derailment, collision, or crash, code Other specified (<u>8</u>).

Code *Transport vehicle is site of injury event* (<u>4</u>) only if *Mode of transport* is coded Railway train or <u>rail vehicle</u>, <u>Streetcar</u> or tram, *Watercraft*, or *Aircraft* (T1 <u>8.1</u>, <u>8.2</u>, <u>11</u>.n, or <u>12</u>.n) **and** the vehicle is not involved in a derailment, collision, or crash.

To code Type of Sport/Exercise Activity:

- Select the *sport or exercise* activity engaged in at the time of *injury*. Depending on the level of detail known, select either a *broad* description of the activity (whole number) or a more specific activity (decimal).
- Code individual participation in an activity related to a team sport as that team sport. For example, if an *injury* occurs while an individual is shooting a basketball alone, code the sport as Basketball (1.01).
- Code training for a particular sport as that sport. For instance, if a participant is injured while weight training during football practice, code the sport as Football American tackle (1.02), rather than Strength training/body building (13.03).

Sorting injuries by <u>phase of activity</u> may facilitate a better understanding of *injury* mechanisms and prevention strategies. The timing of an *injury* during competition or time-limited participation should be gathered to the level of detail available.

#### Guide for use:

Select the code that most accurately and narrowly describes the *phase of activity*.

For injuries that occur during activities without a clear delineation between Training/practice and Competition/participation (eg., jogging, recreational cycling), select Recreational participation (7).

### Introduction:

ICECI is a tool for classifying circumstances and other characteristics of events (*external causes*) given the presence of an *injury*. *Injury prevention* and control largely depends upon understanding events and factors preceding *injury*.

Both intentional and *unintentional injury events* as well as complications of surgical and medical care are considered to be *external causes*. As a consequence the ICECI definition of *injury* includes the injuries resulting from any of these *external causes*.

### Guide for use:

Terms used in the ICECI have the meanings given in this glossary.

# Abrading = Rubbing

*Injury* caused by scraping or wearing away with pressure and friction, mainly by repeated back and forward movement of an object/substance over the surface of human skin or other tissue. (Based on Manser & Thomson, 1995)

# Accident

See Unintentional injury event.

# Activity when injured

Data element that describes what the injured person was doing when the injury occurred.

# Aircraft

Any device for transporting *passengers* or goods in the air. (WHO, 1992)

# Alcohol use

Data element that describes the suspicion or evidence of *alcohol use* preceding the *injury event* by the injured person and/or other persons involved in the *injury event*.

# Amusement park

A commercially operated park with rides and other devices for entertainment and booths for the sale of food and drink.

(Based on Merriam-Webster, 1977)

# Assault

An act of fatal or non fatal *violence* where physical or other force is used with the *intent* to cause harm, *injury* or death to another person.

#### Automobile

See <u>Car</u>.

#### Being taken care of

Undergoing activities conducted by or at the direction of a health care professional or other care taker, eg. relative, parent.

Includes:

- Health care activity
- Being carried, moved or held
- Being bathed

Glossary

# **Blunt force**

Any external force that produces a change in the speed or direction of a moving object or that causes a *stationary object* to deform or move and that does not involve *piercing/penetrating force* or *machinery*.

(Based on Manser & Thomson, 1995)

# Bus

A motor vehicle designed or adapted primarily for carrying 20 or more persons and requiring a special *driver's* licence.

(Based on WHO, 1992)

Excludes:

- Minibus
- Passenger van or minivan

# Car = Automobile

A four-wheeled motor vehicle designed primarily for carrying up to 10 persons. (WHO, 1992)

Includes:

Passenger van or minivan

# Classification

A system of concepts connected by generic relations. (WCC, 1995)

# **Commercial area**

Location being used at the time primarily for business-related activities that are non-industrial, non-recreational, non-cultural and not public, including buildings and adjacent grounds.

# **Complication of health care**

Health care (including medical or surgical care) unintentionally leading to *injury* or other harm. This includes acts of omission as well as acts of commission.

# **Construction area**

Location being used at the time primarily for building or demolition, including buildings and adjacent grounds.

# Contact with foreign object

Contact between human tissue and an object not belonging where it is found, eg. a piece of grit in the eye, a button found in the outer ear, etc. (Based on Manser & Thomson, 1995)

#### **Context of assault**

Data element within the *Violence* Module that describes the circumstances surrounding the violent *injury event*.

### Counterpart

Data element within the Transport Module that describes the other vehicle, object, person or animal (if any) with which the injured person, or the vehicle in which the injured person was *travelling*, collided.

# Cycleway

That part of the public highway designed, improved and customarily used for pedal cycle traffic.

#### **Direct mechanism**

The mechanism that caused the physical harm. See also <u>Underlying mechanism</u>

#### Direct object or substance

The object/substance that caused the physical harm. See also <u>Underlying object or substance</u>

#### Driver

An occupant of a transport vehicle who is operating it, intending to operate it, or has just finished operating it. (Based on WHO, 1992)

#### Drowning

This is death following *submersion* or *immersion* and includes cases where death occurred after hospital admission. The term describes the outcome of an *injury event*. (Bierens, 1996)

#### **Economic activity**

Data element within the Occupational Module that describes the type of industry or business in which the injured person was working at the time of *injury*.

#### Education

Glossary

Activities that form part of a formal course or program of instruction provided by a *school*, college, university, adult *education* institution, etc.

### **Environmental countermeasures**

Data element within the *Sports* Module describing measures that exist in the competitive or recreational environment, which are designed to protect against *injury*, eg. padded goal posts, barriers to separate participants from spectators or traffic. Excludes: <u>Personal Countermeasures</u>

### **External causes**

Environmental events and circumstances identified as the cause of *injury*. (Based on WHO, 1992)

# Falling

To descend or drop by force of gravity, ie. a "nonsyncopal event not attributable to sustaining a violent blow, loss of consciousness, stroke or epileptic seizure" (Kellogg definition from: Leipzig et al. 1999). This includes *falling* on same level, *falling* from a height, *falling* on stairs etc. For guidance on how to determine the height of a fall, please see <u>Height of fall</u>.

### Farm or other place of primary production

Any *place of primary production* that produces at least one of the following products intended for sale: crops, vegetables, horticultural specialities and nursery products, trees, fruit, nuts, animals and animal products, including buildings and adjacent grounds.

# Farmhouse

A farmer's usual living quarters.

# Fixed object = Stationary object

Inanimate object that is not in motion at the time of the *injury event*, with the exception of vehicles that are stopped in traffic.

# Hanging

Compression of neck by rope, cloth, belt or another object (eg. bedrails) which is bearing whole or part of the weight of the *hanging* person. Includes:

• cases involving restriction of blood flow or spinal cord damage by similar mechanisms.

#### Heavy transport vehicle

A motor vehicle designed primarily for carrying property, meeting local criteria for *classification* as a heavy goods vehicle in terms of curbside weight (usually above 3500 kg), and requiring a special driver's licence.

(WHO, 1992)

# Height of fall

The height of a fall is defined with respect to the vertical distance between the surface/object bearing (most) weight before and after the fall.

Examples:

- A child standing on a bed falls to the floor.
  - The bed supports the weight of the child before the fall and the floor bears the weight after the fall. Thus the distance of the fall is the distance between the top of the bed and the floor
- A child swinging on a monkey bar falls to the ground. The monkey bar bears the child's weight before the fall and the ground surface the weight after the fall. Therefore the distance of the fall is the distance between the monkey bar and the ground
- A person sitting on a bicycle falls to the ground. The bicycle seat carries most of the person's weight before the fall and the ground after the fall. The distance of the fall is the distance between the bicycle seat and the ground.
- A person walking on a footpath, stumbles and falls to the ground. The ground carries most of the person's weight before and after the fall. The fall is therefore a fall on the same level.
- A person sitting in a chair, on a bed, etc. falls to the ground while trying to stand. The chair (or other sitting surface) supports most of the weight of the person before the fall and the floor bears the weight after the fall. The height of the fall is the distance between the surface on which the person sat and the floor.

# Home

A person's usual residence including adjacent grounds.

# Hut

An often small and temporary dwelling of a simple construction, built from cardboard, sail, fabric, wood etc.

(Based on Merriam-Webster, 1977)

# ICD

Abbreviation for International Statistical *Classification* of Diseases and Related Health Problems.

# Immersion

Glossary

The involuntary entry of a person into a body of water. The term describes the circumstances of the *injury event*. (Bierens, 1996)

#### Indoor/outdoor

Data element within the Place Module that describes whether the injured person was inside a building or in the open air when the *injury event* started.

#### Industrial area

Location designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, manufacturing, mining, extraction and other industrial activities, including buildings, other structures, excavations and adjacent grounds.

#### Infant or child product

An object/substance made especially for the care and amusement of children.

#### Injury

A (suspected) bodily lesion resulting from acute overexposure to energy (this can be mechanical, thermal, electrical, chemical or radiant) interacting with the body in amounts or rates that exceed the threshold of physiological tolerance. In some case an *injury* results from an insufficiency of vital elements, such as oxygen. Acute poisonings and toxic effects, including overdoses of substances and wrong substances given or taken in error are included, as are adverse effects and complications of therapeutic, surgical and medical care. Psychological harm is excluded in this context.

Note: the scope of this definition is in accordance with the scope of ICD-10 chapter XIX

#### Injury aetiology

Study of the causes of injuries.

#### **Injury control**

Efforts to prevent agents from reaching people in amounts or at rates that exceed human tolerance as well as measures to prevent or minimise complications or disability resulting from *injury*. *Injury control* thus includes primary, secondary and tertiary <u>injury prevention</u> strategies. (Based on Sleet, 1991)

#### Injury event

An incident leading to injury.

# Injury event prevention

See <u>Primary prevention</u>. Glossary

# **Injury prevention**

See Primary prevention Secondary prevention Tertiary prevention

# Inside/outside city limits

Data element within the Place Module that describes the specific location—whether inside or outside city limits—where the injured person was when the injury event started.

### Intent

Data element that describes the role of human purpose in the injury event.

# Intentional injury event = Violence

A deliberate incident with the *intent* to cause harm, *injury* or death, where physical or other force was used (or threatened to be used) against oneself or another person and which led to *injury*.

# Intentional self-harm

Deliberate use of physical or other force or agent against oneself, with the *intent* to cause harm, *injury* or death.

# International Statistical Classification of Diseases and Related Health Problems (ICD)

The *classification* of specific conditions and groups of conditions determined by an internationally representative group of experts who advise the World Health Organization, which publishes the complete list in a periodically revised book. Notes: *ICD*-9, the 9th revision was published by WHO, 1977

ICD-10, the 10th revision was published by WHO, 1992

# Land transport vehicle

A device primarily designed for, and being used at the time primarily for, transporting persons or goods from one place to another on land. (Based on WHO, 1992)

# Legal intervention

Physical or other force used by police or other law-enforcing agents, including military on duty, in the course of arresting or attempting to arrest lawbreakers, suppressing disturbances, maintaining order, and other legal action. Includes:

legal execution

Glossary

Excludes:

• citizen arrest

## Leisure or play

Hobby and other activities undertaken mainly for pleasure and relaxation. May be passive (watching TV) or active (dancing at a party), undertaken alone (reading) or with other people (children playing 'hide and seek'), commercial (attending a 'fun park') or not (family picnic at a public park) and formally organised (day-trip) or not (a child 'just playing').

## Light transport vehicle

A motor vehicle designed primarily for carrying property, (usually) having a maximum weight of 3500 kg. (Adapted from WHO, 1992)

## Machinery

A device with moving parts, which is usually powered (by electricity, gas, steam, etc) and which is designed to perform a particular task. (Based on Manser & Thomson, 1995)

## **Mechanical force**

A force that concerns machines, ie. actions performed with or worked by *machinery*. (Based on Manser & Thomson, 1995)

## Mechanism of injury

Data element that describes the way in which the *injury* was sustained, ie. how the person was hurt.

## Medical service area

Location designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, providing health care, including buildings and adjacent grounds.

## Mode of transport

Data element within the Transport Module that describes the means by which the injured person was *travelling* from one place to another.

#### Motorcycle rider

Any person riding on a motorcycle or in a sidecar or trailer attached to such a vehicle. (WHO, 1992)

## Motor home

An automotive vehicle built on a *bus* or truck chassis and equipped as a self-contained *travelling home*. (Based on Merriam-Webster, 1977)

#### **Near Drowning**

This refers to survival after *submersion* or *immersion*. The term describes the outcome of an *injury event*. (Bierens, 1996)

## Non-traffic injury event

Any *land transport vehicle* incident occurring entirely in any place other than a *public highway* and resulting in *injury*. Incidents involving only <u>off-road vehicles</u> are classified as non-traffic events, unless specified to have been traffic events. (Based on WHO, 1992)

## **Object/substance producing injury**

Data element that describes a matter, material or thing involved in an injury event.

#### Occupation

Data element within the Occupational Module that describes the type of *paid work* the injured person was engaged in when the *injury event* took place.

#### **Occupational accident**

An unintentional occupational injury event.

#### **Occupational injury event**

Any incident taking place during the performance of professional and paid activity and resulting in *injury*. (Based on EHLASS, 1997)

#### **Off-road vehicle**

See Special all-terrain vehicle

#### Operations of war and civil conflict

Physical or other force used by one or more person(s) against one or more other person(s) in the course of combat activities during war or civil conflict.

#### **Paid work**

Activity for which a person is paid, or expects to be paid, a salary, commission or other monetary income. Excludes: <u>Unpaid work</u>

## Parking area

Location open to the public as a matter of right or custom designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for storing *transport devices*.

## Part of building or grounds

Data element within the Place Module that describes the specific part of a building, or the adjacent grounds, where the injured person was when the *injury event* started.

#### Passenger

Any occupant of a transport vehicle or *pedestrian conveyance* other than the *driver* or operator. (Based on WHO, 1992)

Excludes:

• person travelling on outside of vehicle

#### Pedal cycle

Any *land transport vehicle* operated solely by pedals. (WHO, 1992) Includes:

- bicycle
- tricycle

Excludes:

- motorized bicycle
- child's toy tricycle

#### **Pedal cyclist**

Any person riding on a pedal cycle or in a sidecar or trailer attached to such a vehicle. (WHO, 1992)

#### Pedestrian

Any person travelling form one place to another involved in a *transport injury event* who was not at the time of the event riding in or on a motor vehicle, *pedal cycle*, railway train, *streetcar*, animal, animal-drawn or other vehicle, *watercraft*, or *aircraft*.

(Based on WHO, 1992)

Includes:

- person on foot
- user of a pedestrian conveyance

## **Pedestrian conveyance**

Any device, usually non-motorized, used for *pedestrian* transport. Includes:

- baby carriage, perambulator
- ice-skates
- in-line skates, roller skates
- push-cart
- push-chair, stroller
- scooter
- skateboard
- skis
- sled
- wheelchair

## Perpetrator/victim relationship

Data element within the *Violence* Module that describes the relationship of the person committing the violent act to the injured person.

## Personal countermeasures

Data element within the *Sports* Module that describes equipment used or worn by participants to protect against *injury*. Excludes: Environmental Countermeasures

## Person on foot

A *person on foot* is a *pedestrian* who was not, at the time of the *injury event*, using a <u>pedestrian</u> <u>conveyance</u>.

#### Person on outside of vehicle

Any person being transported by a vehicle but not occupying the space normally reserved for the *driver* or *passengers*, or the space intended for the transport of property. (WHO, 1992)

Includes person travelling on:

- bodywork
- bumper, fender
- hanging on outside
- roof (rack)
- running-board
- step

## Phase of activity

Data element within the *Sports* Module that describes the phase of a sport or *exercise* activity during which the *injury event* occurred.

#### **Pick-up truck**

A four- or six-wheeled motor vehicle designed primarily for carrying property, weighing less than the local limit for *classification* as a heavy goods vehicle, and not requiring a special driver's licence. The load-carrying area, which is usually surrounded by low walls, does not normally have a fixed roof. It may be enclosed by a removable cover, often made of cloth. (based on WHO, 1992) See also Van.

#### **Piercing/penetrating force**

A force that makes a hole in or through, that punctures, or forces a way through or into human tissue. (Based on Manser & Thomson, 1995)

#### Place of occurrence

Data element that describes where the injured person was when the injury event started.

## Playground

Area equipped with facilities and devices for recreation by children.

#### **Previous suicide attempt**

Data element within the *Violence* Module that describes whether or not the injured person attempted suicide before.

#### Primary prevention = Injury event prevention

Measures seeking to prevent the occurrence of *injury events* through eg. *education*, enforcement and improvement of the environment. (Based on WHO, 1984 and Avery, 1995) See also <u>Secondary prevention</u> <u>Tertiary prevention</u>

## Private parking area

Location explicitly not open to the public designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, storing *transport devices*.

#### **Private road**

The entire width between the property lines (or other boundary lines) of land explicitly not open to the public for purposes of moving persons or property from one place to another.

## Proximal risk factors for intentional self-harm

Data element within the *Violence* Module that describes the most recent crises that led to the self-harm incident.

#### Psychoactive drug or substance use

Data element that describes the suspicion or evidence of psychoactive drugs use (eg. opiates, cocaine, amphetamines, cannabinoids, sedatives, hypnotics) or other psychoactive substance use (eg. hair spray, gasoline, glue) preceding the *injury event* by the injured person and/or other persons involved in the *injury event*.

#### Public highway = Trafficway, Street, Road

The entire width between the property lines (or other boundary lines) of land open to the public as a matter of right or custom for purposes of moving persons or property from one place to another.

(WHO, 1992)

#### Public transport area or facility

Location designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, receiving and discharging *passengers* and cargo of public *transport devices*.

## Rail vehicle

Any device, with or without cars coupled to it, designed for traffic on a railway. (WHO, 1992)

Includes:

- interurban: electric *car* (operated chiefly on its own right of way not open to other traffic)
- streetcar
- railway train, any power [diesel] [electric] [steam]:
- funicular
- monorail or two rail
- subterranean or elevated
- other vehicle designed to run on a railway track

Excludes:

• interurban electric cars [streetcars] specified to be operating on a right-of-way that forms part of the *public highway* or *street* 

## **Residential institution**

Establishment replacing a person's usual residence, including buildings and adjacent grounds.

## **Resident of home**

Data element within the Place Module that describes the occupant of the *home* where the injured person was when the *injury event* started.

#### Road

See Public highway.

#### Roadway

That part of the *public highway* designed, improved and customarily used for vehicular traffic. (WHO, 1992)

#### Role of the injured person

Data element within the Transport Module that describes how the injured person was involved with the specified *mode of transport* at the time of the *injury event*.

#### Rubbing

See Abrading.

#### School, educational area

Location designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, *education* purposes, including buildings and adjacent grounds.

#### Secondary prevention = Injury prevention

Measures seeking to prevent *injury* or reduce the severity of *injury* through eg. the implementation of safety aids and acute care. (Based on WHO, 1984 and Avery, 1995) See also *Primary prevention Tertiary prevention* 

#### Sex of perpetrator

Data element within the *Violence* Module that describes the sex of the person who inflicted the *injury*.

#### Sidewalk

That part of the public highway designed, improved and customarily used for pedestrian traffic.

#### Special all-terrain vehicle = Off-road vehicle

A motor vehicle of special design to enable it to negotiate rough or soft terrain or snow. Examples of special design are high construction, special wheels and tyres, tracks, and support on a cushion of air. (WHO, 1992) Glossary Includes:

- hovercraft on land or swamp
- snowmobile

Excludes:

hovercraft on open water—see Watercraft

## Special vehicle mainly used in agriculture

A motor vehicle designed specifically for use in *farm*ing and agriculture (horticulture), for example to work the land, tend and harvest crops and transport materials on the *farm*. (WHO, 1992)

Includes:

- combine harvester
- self-propelled farm machinery
- tractor (and trailer)

## Special vehicle mainly used in construction

A motor vehicle designed specifically for use in the construction (and demolition) of *road*s, buildings and other structures.

(WHO, 1992)

Includes:

- bulldozer
- digger
- dump truck
- earth-leveller
- mechanical shovel
- road-roller

## Special vehicle mainly used in industry

A motor vehicle designed primarily for use within the buildings and premises of industrial or commercial establishments.

(WHO, 1992)

Includes:

- battery-powered airport passenger vehicle
- battery-powered truck (baggage) (mail)
- coal-car in mine
- forklift (truck)
- logging car
- self-propelled truck, industrial
- station baggage truck (powered)
- tram, truck or tub (powered) in mine or quarry

## **Sports accident**

An unintentional sports injury event.

## Sports injury event

Any incident taking place while participating in *sports and exercise*-related activities and resulting in *injury*.

## Sports and athletics area

Location designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, *sports and exercise* or athletics, including buildings and adjacent grounds.

## Sports and exercise

Physical activity with a described functional purpose eg. competition, practicing for competition, improving physical health. This includes practice and training activities, as well as pre-event (eg. taping, dressing), warm-up, competition, cool-down and post-event (eg. showering, dressing). Travel to and from the event or activity is not included. (Based on WHO, 1992)

## **Stationary object**

See Fixed object.

## Strangling

The application of pressure to the throat of a person.

## Street

See Public highway.

## Streetcar

A device designed and used primarily for transporting persons within a municipality, running on rails, usually subject to normal traffic control signals, and operated principally on a right-of-way that forms part of the *roadway*. A trailer being towed by a *streetcar* is considered a part of the *streetcar*.

(WHO, 1992) Includes:

includes:

- interurban electric *car* or *streetcar*, when specified to be operating on a *street* or *public highway*
- tram (car)
- trolley (car)

## Submersion

A person comes to lie under the surface of a body of water. *Submersion* can happen after a period of *immersion*. The term describes the circumstances of an *injury event*. (Bierens, 1996)

## **Tertiary prevention**

Measures seeking to prevent or minimise any complications of and disability from *injury* eg. advanced trauma care, life support and rehabilitation. (Based on WHO, 1984 and Avery, 1995) See also: <u>Primary prevention</u> <u>Secondary prevention</u>

## Thermal mechanism

Mechanism involving extreme heat or cold, from either natural or human-created sources.

## Three-wheeled motor vehicle

A motorised tricycle designed primarily for on-*road* use. (WHO, 1992) Includes:

- motor-driven tricycle
- motorized rickshaw
- three-wheeled motor car

Excludes:

- motorcycle with sidecar
- special all-terrain vehicle

## **Traffic accident**

An unintentional traffic injury event.

## Traffic injury event

Any *land transport vehicle* incident occurring on the *public highway* [ie. originating on, terminating on, or involving a vehicle partially on the highway] and resulting in *injury*. A *land transport vehicle* incident is assumed to have occurred on the *public highway* unless another place is specified, except in the case of incidents involving only off-*road* motor vehicles, which are classified as *non-traffic injury event*s unless the contrary is stated. (Based on WHO, 1992)

## Trafficway

See Public highway.

## **Transport accident**

An unintentional transport injury event.

## Transport area

Location designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, conveying persons or goods from one place to another.

## **Transport device**

A device designed primarily for, and being used at the time primarily for, conveying persons or goods from one place to another. (WHO, 1992)

## Transport injury event

Any incident involving a *transport device* and resulting in *injury*. (Based on WHO, 1992)

## Travelling

To go from one place to another by any means of transport or as a pedestrian.

## Two-wheeled motor vehicle

A motorized *transport device* with two wheels, one or two riding saddles and sometimes with a third wheel for the support of a sidecar. The sidecar is considered part of the *two-wheeled motor vehicle*.

(WHO, 1992)

## Type of conflict

Data element within the *Violence* Module that describes the type of war or civil conflict underway when the *injury* occurred.

## Type of home

Data element within the Place Module that describes the kind of *home* where the injured person was when the *injury event* started.

## Type of medical service area

Data element within the Place Module that describes the kind of *medical service area* where the injured person was when the *injury event* started. (Note: codes have not yet been assigned to this item because of national differences in the organisation and designation of services.)

## Type of legal intervention

Data element within the *Violence* Module that describes the *type of legal intervention* during which a person was injured.

## Type of school

Data element within the Place Module that describes the kind of *school* or *educational area* where the injured person was when the *injury event* started.

## Type of sport/exercise activity

Data element within the *Sports* Module that specifies the sport or *exercise* activity in which the injured person was participating at the time of the *injury event*.

## Type of transport injury event

Data element within the Transport Module that describes the general nature of the *transport injury event* and, for a land transport event, whether it was a traffic or non-traffic event.

#### Underlying mechanism

The mechanism involved at the start of the *injury event* See also: <u>Direct mechanism</u>

#### Underlying object or substance

The object/substance involved at the start of the *injury event*. See also: <u>Direct object or substance</u>

#### **Undetermined intent**

Available information is insufficient to make a distinction between *unintentional injury event*, *intentional self-harm*, *assault* or other *violence*. (Based on WHO, 1992)

#### Unintentional injury event = Accident

An unforeseen incident, where there was no *intent* by a person to cause harm, *injury* or death, but which resulted in *injury*.

#### **Unpaid work**

Activity for which no money is received but for which a *paid work*er could be hired. Includes: work for payment-in-kind, or other non-monetary remuneration. Excludes: <u>*Paid work*</u>

#### Van

A four- or six-wheeled motor vehicle designed primarily for carrying property, weighing less than the local limit for *classification* as a heavy goods vehicle, and not requiring a special driver's licence. The load-carrying area is enclosed by side walls and a roof, and usually has large doors at the side and/or rear.

(based on WHO, 1992)

See also Pick-up truck.

#### Vehicle occupant

A driver or passenger in a transport vehicle.

#### Violence

See Intentional injury event.

## Vital activity

Basic activities necessary for life, for example sleeping, eating and getting dressed.

#### Watercraft

Any device for transporting *passengers* or goods on water. (WHO, 1992) Includes:

• hovercraft not otherwise specified

## Work-related activity

Paid work and unpaid work.
